Partnerships Work

Tired of a watershed that housed 17 illegal dumps, the Aultman Run Watershed for Restoring the Environment (AWARE) was determined to return the land to its natural state. They looked to PA CleanWays of Indiana County for expertise, building on the partnerships and relationships that the organization had already established in the area. They're now working to remove a major source of non-point source pollution from the watershed.









Communities Care

One resident of Greene County was skeptical when he first saw the mountains of trash at a 50 year old dumpsite. "There's no way anyone can clean this mess up!" It took 87

volunteers six days, seven 30-yard roll-offs, and seven dump trucks to clean up the site, resulting in the recycling or proper disposal of 57 tons of trash, 120 tires, and a heap of appliances.

Teen Leads the Way

Corina Bundy is a teenager with a mission...to clean up McKean County. Inspired by her Enrichment teacher to tackle the issue of illegal dumping in the county, she helped document the dumpsites, presented

the findings to the County Commissioners, created a booklet on the illegal dumping problem in the county, and became vice president of the PA CleanWays chapter, helping her group win the Governor's Award for Watershed Stewardship.

Volunteers Make the Difference

Sylvia Hardman grew up in Penn's Woods, hiked its trails and learned to swim in its lakes. But as an adult, she experienced forests littered with every imaginable kind of trash, and became soul-sick.

Recently, she heard about the Forest Lands Beautification Program and the work PA CleanWays is doing to "Transforming a dump site back into unspoiled forest is very, very satisfying."

provide volunteers with the wherewithal to conduct cleanups.

Sylvia volunteered to help clean up Pennsylvania's state parks and forests and was sold on the process. She continues to keep the momentum going by working to establish a local chapter in Cumberland County.





Forest Lands Beautification Project

Kevin Fazzini, the manager of Lehigh Gorge State Park, worked with PA CleanWays through the Forest Lands Beautification Program. "I am extremely satisfied with the work done by PA CleanWays at Lehigh Gorge State Park. We know from past experiences that, by cleaning up the illegal dump sites, people are reluctant to continue dumping there and the area remains trash free and natural, as it was intended to be."

Educational Projects

Tell them, they forget. Show them, they'll remember. Involve them, they'll understand.

This PA CleanWays approach not only opens the eyes of the individual to the problem, but instills a sense of pride and ownership of the solution.

"Open Your Eyes to Litter" Activity Book Series

Work continued with the creation, printing and distribution of "Our Littered Past" and the beginning work on "Think Before You Toss."

Each of our activity books has a teacher's guide, which offers teaching suggestions linked to the PA Educational Standards, in addition to resources and student materials. During 2001-2002, we completed the teacher's guide to "Our Littered Past."

PA CleanWays worked with a local educator to translate "Our Littered Past" into Spanish in order to make educational materials available to Spanish speaking students, Spanish classes, and teachers in Pennsylvania.

Litter Action Award

Recognizing that there are many young people and youth groups already doing remarkable things to improve and clean up our environment, we initiated the development of an award to acknowledge their efforts.

"Open Your Eyes to Litter" Poster Contest & Placemats

For the second year in a row, we held a poster contest for grades 4-6, awarding a prize to the winner at each grade level and to the grand prize winner.

Following the successful first year of our statewide contest, we designed placemats with the winning entries and distributed them in the spring of 2002 for use during Earth Month activities.

Project Trash

Using a DEP Environmental Education Grant, we updated Project Trash, a learning tool for grades 5 through 9. It is designed to promote long-term environmental change in a community, focusing on litter, illegal dumping and solid waste issues.

We provided two workshops to a total of 20 teachers, as well as distributing over 500 copies of Project Trash at professional conferences and through PA CleanWays chapters.

Recycling Board and Guide

With the huge success of the Litter IQ Boards, we created a prototype of a Recycling Board, along with a 26-page guide.

This colorful, interactive board allows children and adults to choose items "from the curb" and match them with recycled products headed "to the shelf" at their local stores.

Photo Contest

We held the 3rd Annual Photo Contest, in which PA CleanWays chapters entered photos of their activities in 11 different categories, winning cash prizes for their efforts. The contest helps chapters develop a collection of quality photographs to use in newsletters and press releases, promoting the work of PA CleanWays throughout their counties.

Environmental Education Activities Series

Our education team began work and started research on a series of science activities focused on recycling and closing the loop, composting, environmental laws and renewable and nonrenewable resources.

These activities will be directly linked to Pennsylvania Environment and Ecology curriculum standards.

Chapter & Cleanup Highlights

Noteworthy News

The Allegheny County chapter of PA CleanWays received a grant from The Pittsburgh Foundation to survey illegal dumpsites in Pittsburgh. The study identified 183 sites within the city limits and was showcased as part of a panel discussion on urban dumping/littering at the U.S. Mayor's Association Waste Summit and Conference.

A waterway adoption through the **Bedford County** chapter provided the stimulus for the founding of a local watershed group, the Bob's Creek Stream Guardians, whose cleanup projects so far have removed almost 75 tons of trash, several tons of tires, and abandoned vehicles.

The Blair, Huntingdon and Westmoreland County chapters won the 2002 Waste Watcher Awards. Sixtytwo organizations from 28 counties were honored in a ceremony in Harrisburg. The Waste Watcher Awards are co-sponsored by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), the Professional Recyclers of Pennsylvania (PROP), and the Pennsylvania Waste Industries Association (PWIA).


The McKean County chapter of PA CleanWays received the Governor's Water Stewardship Award at a ceremony in Harrisburg. The chapter was also acknowledged with a "Senate of Pennsylvania Certificate of Recognition" for its efforts in McKean County.

The **Westmoreland County** chapter of PA CleanWays was the recipient of the Dominion Peoples Community Impact Award for their Residential Paper Recycling Program.

Unique Cleanups

Each dumpsite has characteristics which make it unique. A few sites stood out in 2001-2002, because of their impact on the environment, classic difficulty, challenging terrain, or rare beauty.

Cleaning a river walk in Neshaminy State Park, located along the Delaware River, restored the area to a natural habitat for 39 protected species of plants and animals.





Stabilizing the Slope After a Landslide

Trash still remained on the steep, rocky slope in Cowan's Gap State Park, after a landslide cascaded down the hill and swept much of the trash to the bottom. Because of the terrain and the instability of the soil. the trash left at this dumpsite along Knobsville Road had to be handpicked. A French drain was installed and a GeoWeb cellular containment system was secured into the bedrock to maintain the integrity of the slope. Rich soil was removed from the bottom of the nearby lake, which had been drained for maintenance earlier in the year. The GeoWeb was filled with soil, seeded and covered with a biodegradable erosion control mat to stabilize the site until the seed could germinate. Trees, damaged by the landslide, were felled and laid over the top of the slope to help contain the soil during heavy rains.








Returning Beauty to a Waterfall

The trash at Leslie Run in Lehigh Gorge State Park was in close proximity to a beautiful waterfall, marred by tons of appliances, tires, furniture, and other trash dumped there over the years. In order to remove the trash without damaging the environment, a contractor carefully cut small trees to gain access to the trash, lifted large items via a custom crane, and hand-picked the rest of the trash from

among the rocks. The workers then bundled and lifted the trimmed branches up to the top of the slope and used them as a natural mulch to secure the hillside. Pine branches trimmed by the park service along the trail were also added to aid in erosion control. The beautiful view of the waterfall and the surrounding terrain was restored.



A Spark to Ignite Cleaner Communities

A grant from the Environmental Protection Agency enabled PA CleanWays to provide technical assistance in clearing illegal dumps from communities without chapters.

PA CleanWays offered its creative, comprehensive, community-based approach across the state. A PA CleanWays consultant was available to provide guidance and training for local coordinators, where a resident was interested in taking the lead in cleaning up a dumpsite.

Other selection factors included the amount and type of trash, technical difficulties, frequency of dumping, and potential for local support. Concerned citizens organized and cleaned up 18.5 tons of trash.

In Beaver and Butler counties, the technical assistance provided by PA CleanWays led to successful cleanups and ignited long-term interest in addressing illegal dumping and littering in those counties.

Building Successful Partnerships

Pawpaw Way, known as a "paper street" to Pittsburgh city planners, was recognized by local concerned residents as a prime dumping area. One resident got involved by reporting the site to PA CleanWays of Allegheny county. The group then teamed with other residents, the PA Department of Environmental Protection, the Hazelwood Initiative, the City of Pittsburgh, students from Schenley High School, and others.

Once the ball got rolling, there was no stopping them. A local landscaper donated staff, dump trucks and tools. A senior at Schenley High School partnered with the chapter to earn his Boy Scout Eagle Award. After the cleanup, he visited the site to plant grass seed and check on the area for any subsequent dumping activity.

Beautification & Deterrents

Tree Bank

In April 2002, approximately 4,000 seedlings, 2-gallon pots, and an allowance for top soil were provided to PA CleanWays by the National Tree Trust through Forest Products Industries as part of their Community Tree Planting program. Volunteers donated their time to pot and nurture the trees. In the fall, after the trees established a healthy root system and reached a height of 1-4 feet, they were provided free to the public through PA CleanWays chapters for planting on public lands such as parks, school grounds, cemeteries, public golf courses and roadways.

4,000 seedlings were potted by 139 volunteers working for a total of 558 hours.


197 volunteers contributed 854 hours to maintain the tree bank and prepare the trees for distribution.

Working Together

Through the Forest Lands Beautification Program, PA CleanWays gathered information on the criminal codes dealing with littering and dumping in Pennsylvania. The book provides information about the agencies responsible for enforcing the codes, the penalties involved, and guidelines for citizens when reporting illegal dumping to enforcement agents. It's the only book of its kind in the state.








Monitoring Sites


Volunteer monitors helped to maintain the integrity of cleaned dumpsites across the state. They checked for evidence, contacted the proper enforcement agency, and removed any trash found.



In addition to cleaning the sites, the areas were often seeded and mulched and deterrents, such as rocks, signs, and gates, were used to discourage future dumping activity.
