So while in 2012, our volunteers picked up 15 bags of trash for every tree, flower or bulb they planted, we aren't going to shy away from the fact that yes, we help people clean up their communities. We believe that clean and beautiful communities are the bedrock for building stronger more vibrant communities and from our vantage point, getting in on the ground level of community development is a great place to be.

ANNUAL VOLUNTEER RECOGNITION DINNER

Volunteers, friends, and staff gathered to celebrate individual and organizational accomplishments on December 11, 2012, at the Fred Rogers Center on the campus of Saint Vincent College. In addition to the annual business meeting and round-robin training for affiliates focused on Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful and Keep America Beautiful programming, it was a time to recognize and honor those who make our mission possible.

Celina Seftas from Keep Huntingdon County Beautiful accepted the Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful President's Award for Distinction in Volunteerism. Celina has been an integral part of the Huntingdon County affiliate since 2002, becoming affiliate coordinator in 2008. Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful Gold Shovel Awards were also presented for outstanding programing work accomplished in three focus areas of Prevent It, Clean It, and Keep It.

Prevent It! Since the inception of PA CleanWays of McKean County's annual unwanted household medical waste collection program in 2008, 1,000 pounds of pharmaceuticals have been collected.

Clean It! Since its beginnings, more than 2,600 Allegheny CleanWays' Tireless Project volunteers have extracted 173 tons of debris, including 2,170 tires and 310 bags of recyclables from the rivers' shores.

Keep It! The York County Solid Waste Authority (YCSWA) provides York County volunteers with free trash disposal year round. They distributed thousands of Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful Open Your Eyes to Litter books, and in 2012, offered residents free tire disposal over a period of a month in support of Keep York County Beautiful's goal to prevent and eliminate illegal dumping.

Additionally, two corporate sponsors received a Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful Gold Shovel Award. The Home Depot and BEHR Paint were awarded Gold Shovel Awards for their contributions in 2012 to various Community Greening and Beautification Programs including the Ohio Valley Region VA Hospital Community Beautification and Greening Project and Fresh Paint Days Pennsylvania.

Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful affiliates and local Keep America Beautiful affiliates nominated their own volunteer of the year and these volunteers were presented with an engraved walking stick as a tribute to their efforts to keep Pennsylvania beautiful. SURVEILLANCE CAMERAS AIM TO CURB ILLEGAL DUMPING IN WASHINGTON COUNTY

Keep Washington County Beautiful and Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful have partnered with the Washington County Court System Furlough Into Service Program, funded by the Department of Community and Economic Development-Local Share Account Program, and local officials and law enforcement; the ultimate goal is a clean and beautiful Washington County.

High-tech cameras will be utilized throughout Washington County to capture license plate numbers and images of acts of illegal dumping and vehicle descriptions. All evidence gathered from these cameras will be used to prosecute individuals to the fullest extent of the law. Enforcement actions including monetary fines and community service hours will be imposed on violators. The cameras will be repositioned around the county as needed. In the past several months, evidence found in local dumpsites resulted in successful prosecutions against two individuals for dumping waste along Washington County roads. Two other cases are currently in process.

In 2005, Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful's Illegal Dump Survey identified 126 illegal dump sites, containing an estimated 317 tons of trash. Some sites are inactive and once cleaned up will stay that way. Other sites are active and new waste is added on a regular basis. Cleaning up illegally dumped waste can cost between \$800 and \$1,000 per ton; costs included in this estimate are site identification and verification of ownership, logistics coordination, and all direct costs including waste hauling and disposal.

RECYCLING ELECTRONICS

In the next stage of the Pennsylvania Covered Device Act, the Act bans disposing certain electronic items either curbside or in landfills starting January 24th, 2013. Under the Act, covered devices include televisions, desktop and laptop computers, computer monitors and computer peripherals, or anything that connects to a computer.

The Covered Device Recycling Act requires that retailers of computers, computer monitors, and televisions provide customers with information on how and where to recycle these devices. The Department of Environmental Protection maintains a list of various electronics

recycling opportunities and collection locations on its website including county, municipal, nonprofit, and retailer and manufacturer sponsored collection programs. **To view the current list, visit www.depweb.state.pa.us and select Electronics Recycling from the DEP Programs A-Z menu. MAKING A DIFFERENCE ALL YEAR LONG

While we often focus on the cleanup of large illegal dumpsites, Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful volunteers are also in the business of keeping our roadways, waterways, and other natural areas free from litter all year long. Some have been at it for 10 or 20 years! Now that's dedication. These citizens know that personal involvement has proven to be the best way to keep our roads and other areas clean.

Carolyn Royse has been cleaning up Dunn Road in Westmoreland County for over 20 years. The adoption was one of the first for Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful (then PA CleanWays). For years, her family and friends lifted countless tires, appliances, pieces of furniture, beer cases, and drug paraphernalia from the stream and hillside that parallel Dunn Road. Regular patrols of the road helped to eventually stop illegal activity and soon local residents got involved in routine cleanups. The road continues to be maintained for those who walk, cycle, and run the road.

John Somonick and Linda Jones adopted Hilltop and McHenry roads in Indiana County in 2002. Since then, they have logged 754 pounds of aluminum cans, 171 tires, and countless bags of trash. They also voluntarily clean four other local roads

INTERNATIONAL COASTAL CLEANUP - ALLEGHENY OUTFITTERS

Allegheny Outfitters, a family-run canoe and kayak livery and outdoor gear store located along the National Wild & Scenic Allegheny River in Warren County, is a long-time participant of the International Coastal Cleanup. In 2009, owner Piper VanOrd founded a five-day river clean-up to remove garbage from 31 miles of the river to highlight how the Allegheny is an important recreation, ecological, and economic resource in the Pennsylvania Wilds region. The cleanup has attracted hundreds of volunteers and sponsors who over the last four years have pulled more than 34,000 pounds of metal, 1,500 tires, and hundreds of pounds of trash from the river. In 2002, Keep America Beautiful launched its inaugural National Planting Day to celebrate the value and power of native species in restoring ecological balance to the environment while creating greener, more beautiful communities. With a national focus on September 8th and activities running throughout the fall, national nonprofit Keep America Beautiful, its affiliates, and its partners mobilized Americans to plant native species of trees, flowers, and plants. KEEP AMERICA BEAUTIFUL CELEBRATES 60 YEARS

Keep America Beautiful (KAB) held its 60th anniversary National Conference in Washington, D.C. January 28-31, 2012. The conference brought together more than 450 executives from community improvement organizations across the country and focused on building and sustaining vibrant communities. BEDFORD COUNTY CLEANS AND BEAUTIFIES KEEP BEDFORD COUNTY BEAUTIFUL

Each year, the Bedford County Stream Sweep brings together large enthusiastic crowds, drawn to picking up litter and trash from county waterways and beautifying public spaces around Bedford. While most volunteers are picking up trash, even the youngest participants can be found planting bulbs in flower beds with parents and friends, and a picnic style lunch, grilled and served at the park along the river, finishes the day.

In 2007, the outdoor gear company REI built a distribution center in Bedford County and quickly established a reputation of engagement in conservation volunteerism and outdoor education. The 2008 river cleanup was the first time REI participated and when the event was reborn in 2010 as the Bedford County Stream Sweep, REI was a full partner in planning and executing, even assuming the primary role in volunteer registration. At about the same time, Keep Bedford County Beautiful was invited to submit a grant proposal to REI national headquarters. With the assistance of Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful, Keep Bedford County Beautiful was successful in obtaining a \$5000 grant from REI to fund Stream Sweeps for 2011 and 2012. In 2012, another grant invitation resulted in a \$10,000 award to fund another Stream Sweep in 2013 and also to establish a local tree 'bank' to maintain trees and other seedlings for beautification and conservation projects throughout the county. The Keep Bedford County Beautiful tree bank begins operation in 2013 and should be able to distribute seedling transplants to watershed groups and others planning conservation projects in the fall of 2013. Many groups join REI and Keep Bedford County Beautiful for the Stream Sweep and community enthusiasm continues to grow. We are hopeful the tree bank project finds similar success.

TIRE WAR

In 2005, Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful affiliates Keep Huntingdon County Beautiful and PA CleanWays of Mifflin County decided to challenge each other to see which affiliate could collect the most tires at a tire special collection held on the same day. The winner would receive an award they created, the Gold Rim Award. The affiliate collecting the least amount of tires would receive the Flat Tire Award. This past September, the Tire War had its Seventh Annual Event! Over the years two more affiliates have joined

the event, Keep Perry County Beautiful and Keep Juniata County Beautiful. The winner of the 2012 Tire War was newcomer Keep Juniata County Beautiful with 1,700 tires collected and recycled, demonstrating the need for the collection in the County.

Since the inception of the Tire War, 17,092 tires have been collected involving 222 volunteers who donated 1,134 hours in these four rural counties. The events are sponsored by a Department of Environmental Protection Household/Small Business Hazardous Waste Collection Program grant that covers up to half the costs of the collection.
