


Young Ambassador Program Requirements



Waste Reduction and Recycling in Bucks County Pennsylvania

The improper handling of waste can lead to pollution, health hazards, and ecological damage that could be remedied by stricter enforcement of laws, adequate infrastructure, and education about its solutions/sustainable alternatives. 



We Made Connections in Our Communities


- I'm thankful for the connections I've made and the good I've done through the YA program. I'm making a difference in my community, and it feels great! ~Kalub S.
